- Distributed the equivalent of 3.1 million meals and snacks
- Has 68 member programs receiving food and a Mobile Pantry program
- Healthy Start Food Drive and Cereal Box Domino Challenge raised over 1,700 boxes of cereal plus over \$9,000 in donations

- Striving to provide access to healthcare for all



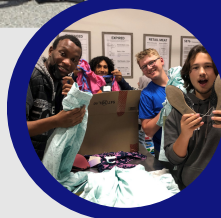
NEW CAPACITIES: NORWICH

VOLUNTEER ENGAGEMENT

Mobilized 650 volunteers who provided 7,355 volunteer hours, an average of more than 11 hours per person

- Student United Way helps high school Juniors and Seniors experience and learn about the needs in New London County and run a grant review process
- Your Voice Counts bridges differences and inspires young adults to create sustainable change in societal dialogue and a kinder, inclusive community
