HEALTHY COMMUNITY (**)

- More than 42,000 individuals accessed services to improve their health.
- The Eastern CT Health Collaborative is implementing Family Bridge, a nurse home visiting program for new mothers. The goals are to improve maternal health outcomes and reduce unnecessary emergency room visits.
- The Gemma E. Moran United Way/Labor Food Center distributed the equivalent of two million meals.
- As part of the annual National Association of Letter Carriers' Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive, Merged Branch 20 donated the equivalent of 15,514 meals to the Food Center.

YOUTH OPPORTUNITY \(\sigma\)



- **510 children** were enrolled in high quality, affordable, and educational childcare programs.
- 90% of youth ages 0-5 in United Way partner programs achieved their developmental milestones.
- Student United Way in its third year has now brought together a total of 49 participants to learned more about community and philanthropy.
- Established the SECT Childcare Collective to address the lack of childcare workers and the number of affordable childcare spots available for working families.



FINANCIAL SECURITY

- According to the ALICE Report, 40% of households in Southeastern CT cannot afford basic needs. We are working to address this through:
- 365 individuals prepared for gainful employment with United Way partner programs.
- Brought \$2.54 million into the community to ensure safe housing for all.
- Over 2,400 individuals accessed homelessness prevention and affordable housing services.
- 4,058 children received toys through Tommy Toy, which celebrated its 50th anniversary in 2024.

COMMUNITY RESILIENCY

- More than 10,100 individuals received disaster relief supports at their greatest time of need.
- 2-1-1 had 27,082 requests for help from callers in New London County. The top five requests were for housing and shelter, mental health and addiction, food, healthcare, and employment and income.
